#### **Foreword**

I am so proud of everything we have achieved at SARSAS this year as we continue to provide vital support and advocacy for victimsurvivors of sexual violence across Avon and Somerset. We have faced unprecedented challenges, navigating the complexities of a world forever altered by the global pandemic and the current impacts of the cost-of-living crisis.

We have continued to grow and adapt as a charity in a rapidly changing environment and in the face of increasing demand (56.25% increase in people coming forward for support compared to prepandemic levels). We retain our commitment to providing high quality, trauma-informed care and support with a focus on hope, healing, and advocacy for all victim-survivors. Our dedicated team of staff and volunteers has worked tirelessly to ensure victim-survivors receive the support they deserve.

This year, we have reflected on how we can build on our impact on all the communities we serve through our digital platforms and external communications. This led us to rebrand and relaunch our website to represent the organisation we are today, supporting people of all genders who have been affected by rape or sexual abuse.

We also expanded our training team to focus on our educational and preventative work across the region, delivering training in topics including consent, healthy relationships, sexual harassment and responding to disclosures to over 1500 students and 1500 professionals.

Our Equity, Diversity and Inclusion work has continued to focus on how we can better support underserved victim-survivors in our region. This year, a central point for us has been engaging with the trans, non-binary and intersex (TNBI) community. We are acutely aware, with our roots in the women's sector, that we need to work harder to ensure that people of all genders feel safe to use our services. Our TNBI focus groups have been insightful and we are incredibly grateful to those involved for working alongside us to inform the services we provide for the TNBI community.

We actively engage with the broader community, fostering partnerships and collaborations to raise awareness about the prevalence of sexual violence and the urgent need for prevention and intervention. We are proud of our new partnership with Glastonbury Festival where we delivered training to the festival staff and on-site wellbeing support to those impacted by sexual harassment and abuse and awareness raising to festival goers.

I am very proud of the victimsurvivor-led work that has been a centre-point of our work over the last year and will be an ongoing focus for SARSAS.

UpFront Survivors is a national programme led by and for victimsurvivors of child sexual abuse (CSA) that supports the CSA community to lead cultural change by creating visible victim-survivor-led community spaces and experiences. We are working with the emerging and thriving victim-survivor communities in this partnership with Viv Gordon Company, The Green House and Coventry University (funded by the Home Office). We hope to embed this work nationally and ensure that national victim-survivor leaders and sexual violence services can work together to support anyone affected by CSA.

Victim-survivor voice has also been a focus of our work around sibling sexual abuse (SSA) where we have been grateful to secure funding allowing us to develop an online National Hub website and community board for adults who have experienced sibling sexual abuse.

I am so grateful to our staff, volunteers, supporters, and partners for all their incredible hard work, and most importantly, to the victimsurvivors who have trusted us to walk alongside them in their journey of healing. This Impact Report is more than a collection of statistics and figures; it is a testament to the strength and courage of victim-survivors, the unwavering commitment of our team, and the enduring support of our community.


The Trustees and I are so proud of SARSAS' work championing the

# Supporting people

Our demand for services continues to rise. In the Financial Year (FY) to 31st March 2023, we received 1,575 referrals for support. This is an increase of 8% compared to FY22 and is 22% higher than FY21. Average referral rates now stand at 56.25% higher than pre-pandemic levels.

Our Pathway Navigator Service provides comprehensive and collaborative triage assessment and signposting for new clients. We delivered 1,033 assessments this year.

#### Specialist support work

Specialist support work provides emotional, practical and advocacy support for victim-survivors with multiple support needs.

This includes specialist support for Autistic women and women

with learning disabilities.

#### Spotlight on group work

This year we adapted and expanded our group work, with a focus on community-based groups, supporting people who may be marginalised and are underserved at SARSAS. This has included groups for trans, non-binary and intersex (TNBI) people, refugee women and women of colour. Many of our groups have been victim-survivor-led, recognising the power of healing alongside people with shared experience.

In the year to 31st March 2023, we ran



# Achieving change and future planning



# Sibling Sexual Abuse (SSA) project

We secured further funding to continue the ground-breaking work we started in the previous year on one of the most common forms of CSA in the UK. An area of sexual violence that remains chronically under-reported and under-researched and is still, for many, a hidden and taboo topic. Working with global partners and a steering group of people with lived experience, we started the development of a dedicated website for adult victim-survivors of SSA. We look forward to launching the website later this year.



# Website launch and rebrand

In June 2022, we were thrilled to showcase a fresh brand for SARSAS that reflects the organisation we are today and recognises our values, aspirations and what we stand for. Alongside this, we launched a new website which better represents who we are, and what we do, offering a more inclusive and accessible experience for all, from victim-survivors through to professionals or people looking for expert information on rape or sexual abuse.

#### **Festivals**

In June 2022, we attended our first ever Glastonbury Festival as part of their welfare area, offering well-being and practical support

to anyone affected by sexual violence, either at the festival or at any other time in their life. We continue to expand on our presence and are pleased to see more festivals recognising the need for specialist sexual violence support and information to improve safety for festival go-ers.

We continue to adapt and respond to the needs of the people we serve. As we look forward, we plan to continue to develop our victim-survivor-led work, putting the victim-survivor

voice at the heart of all that we do. This year saw the start of our Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) strategy implementation with the next financial year bringing a focus on addressing both LGBTQIA+ inclusion and anti-racism.

As ever, we lobby for change in preventing sexual violence through a focus on perpetrators and for justice and support for all victim-survivors affected by rape and sexual abuse.

# Comms and campaigning



Campaigning is an important part of achieving a world without gender-based violence. We continue to influence through both our digital channels and traditional media outlets. As part of our #16DaysofActivisim campaign, we were delighted to 'take over' our patron, Laura Bates', Twitter and Instagram channels to raise awareness about sexual violence and SARSAS services.

# **Training**

Trauma In the last year, our training and team established themselves self-care as an integral part of our external impact delivering training to 3509 people. Through the delivery of workshops on consent, trauma, sexual harassment, bystander intervention, violence against women and responding to disclosures, they have been transforming the wider understanding of sexual violence in our schools, community and statutory organisations and workplaces.

Free Online

In June 2022, they produced an online course on trauma and self-care that is free and available to all via our website. It includes written information and short videos produced by members of the SARSAS training and support team. To date, **756 people** have signed up and accessed part or all of the course.

This year also saw the team win a contract with Nando's to deliver sexual harassment training to their entire operation. This includes 465 UK and Ireland branches and over 10,000 employees with delivery planned for the coming financial year.

# Partnerships and fundraising

Our corporate partners play an important role in helping us raise both awareness and vital funds so we can continue to provide the lifechanging support we offer.

# Our Charity of the Year (COTY) - Creative Construction

We were very pleased to be chosen as Creative Construction's first ever charity partnership of the year 2022 - 2023. Following their refurbishment of our Bristol offices, carried out at cost price, the team from Creative Construction took part in challenge events and donated to our Big Give Christmas challenge helping us to raise over £5000.

#### **Natracare**

We were thrilled to start a partnership with Natracare who previously supported us through a donation of plastic-free and sustainable sanitary products for clients, staff and volunteers. As an organisation that campaigns on gender equality issues, Natracare were a natural fit for some joint work on blogs that explore issues which impact on victim-survivors, such as pregnancy and birth, and menstruation. Natracare also donated £9,000 to our Helpline services.

#### Big Give Christmas Challenge

December 2022, saw us raise over £20,000 in the Big Give Christmas Challenge – our largest ever amount – to help pay for our Helpline services in 2023. The challenge was supported by our charity partners Womble Bond Dickenson, Creative Construction and Osborne Clarke, and our friends at Lower Hill Community festival. The challenge was also supported by over 60 individual supporters.

# Community fundraising

In support of the Big Give one of our supporters and advocates Carole Brooks organised a Clothes Swishing event which raised an incredible £1,650 and was supported by many local businesses who donated raffle prizes.




